

DISTRICT HIRES NEW DIRECTOR OF CURRICULUM AND INSTRUCTION

The Phelps-Clifton Springs Central School District has hired a former student and current parent to serve as its next Director of Curriculum and Instruction.

Michelle Robinette's appointment was approved by the Board of Education to take over for Patti Larche, who retired in December. Robinette joined the district after an extensive interview process involving teachers, administrators and other district personnel.

She previously served as the Director of Curriculum for the Red Creek Central School District, and has a background that includes work as a district data coordinator, in addition to several teaching roles, said Matthew Sickles, superintendent.

"Michelle is also a Midlakes graduate and parent of four current Midlakes students," Sickles said. "The Board of Education and I are excited to add Michelle's professional expertise and investment in our community to the Midlakes family."

Robinette, whose family ran Goodman's Corner Store in Phelps for many years, shared more during a recent interview.

Why Midlakes?

I graduated as a Midlakes Screaming Eagle in 1992. It is a great community. Now my four children attend Midlakes and I always thought it would be a dream come true to come back here to work.

What's your educational philosophy?

I have always had a "whole child" philosophy. I grew up on reduced-price lunch, living in a trailer on my grandparents' property. I was successful in school and was the first in my family to go to college because of the supportive people in my life, including my teachers at Midlakes. It is of the utmost importance that we do all we can to help our students to be healthy, safe, engaged, supported, and challenged.

Can you share more on your career?

I always wanted to be a math teacher but once I began teaching I decided to get my master's in special education thinking

it would make me a better math teacher. I loved it so much I made the switch. I was later asked if I would consider administration, so I completed the program at SUNY Oswego, and worked as a data coordinator in Syracuse.

With four young children, I wanted to get back into the Wayne-Finger Lakes region so I took a position at BOCES and then Red Creek before joining Midlakes.

What impresses you about Midlakes?

I couldn't be happier with how the staff is so caring and positive with the students but with each other. They are willing to try new things and reach out to each other for ideas. It makes it exciting to come to work. We are small enough to have a strong community feel, but large enough to offer many academic and extracurricular programs.

What areas are you ready to tackle?

I see my role as an opportunity to help and support the principals and staff in achieving vertical alignment across subject areas so that there are smooth transitions for our students from one grade level to the next, particularly when they change buildings.

IMPORTANT FORM FOR FAMILIES OF INCOMING KINDERGARTNERS

Parent registration for kindergartners turning five years old by Dec. 1, 2019, will be held in April, followed by screening during the first week of June.

Children turning six years old by Dec. 1, 2019 must receive instruction on the first day of school in September, 2019. Those turning six years old after Dec. 1, 2019 must receive full-time instruction in September 2020.

DISTRICT MESSAGE ON IMPROVING STUDENT ACHIEVEMENT

To improve learning for all students, the Phelps-Clifton Springs Central School District values all information that can help shape the design of what we teach and how we teach.

Every spring, school districts across the state are required to administer New York State assessments in ELA and Math (grades 3-8) and science (grades 4 and 8). The results of these assessments provide teachers with important insights about student progress that help identify appropriate instructional adjustments.

The assessments help determine who needs additional support, who needs enrichment, and who needs more challenging opportunities. It also helps to shape improvements in curriculum and instruction for all students.

Over the past several years, the New York State Education Department (NYSED) has taken steps to respond to

parent and educator concerns regarding the assessments and the standards being tested.

As a result, the annual assessments have been redesigned and shortened, time limits have been removed, and computer-based testing is being implemented, all in response to concerns regarding unnecessary stress on students and the interruption of instructional time. NYSED is also in the process of aligning the annual assessments to new learning standards that are specific to New York State, rather than the Common Core Standards.

In light of these changes and the role the assessments play in helping us meet the needs of our students, we encourage all parents to have their students take the math, ELA, and science assessments, at the appropriate grade levels. Our teachers and administrators take

deliberate steps to administer these assessments in a thoughtful and relaxed manner, and the results help teachers to provide targeted instruction. The best interests of our students guide everything we do.

It is important to note that the state assessments given in grades 3-8 also help prepare students for the experience of taking mandatory state Regents Exams in high school. Regents Exams are required for high school graduation and cannot be refused.

Therefore, it is helpful for students to experience standardized testing before it has a direct impact on their graduation from high school.

Thank you for your continued support and helping us ensure that we have all the information needed to meet the needs and promote the success of all students.


MIDLAKES WADES INTO 'BIG RIVER'

SOPHOMORE RANKED NO. 1 IN STATE

Sophomore Nita Schumacher finished the fall season with the highest overall individual season average for a female with a score of 21.50 out of 25 in the New York State High School Clay Target League.

The score put her at the top of the 1A Conference 2 standings, which was rounded out by Midlakes freshman Sadie Schumacher, Nita's sister, in second with 19.60 and Midlakes sophomore Kelsie Klee with a score of 18.30. As a team, Midlakes finished the fall season ranked second in the conference behind Lancaster High School.

GRAD RETURNS WITH RPO FOR CONCERT

AQUATIC CENTER HOURS, SPECIAL EVENTS

The Midlakes Aquatic Center offers multiple opportunities for open swim, lap swim, and water aerobics to those in the community.

- Lap swim hours are 6-7:30 a.m., Monday, Wednesday and Friday; 7-8 p.m., Monday; and 8-9 p.m., Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday. Passes are \$50 for 20 visits.

- Open swim is from 6-8 p.m., Wednesday and Friday. Cost is \$1 for students; \$3 adults; \$2 seniors; \$5 for families.

- Water aerobics classes are 7:30-8:30 a.m., Monday, Wednesday and Friday; and 7-8 p.m., Tuesday and Thurs-

day. Fee is \$5 for drop-in; 20-class pass is \$70 for adults, \$60 for seniors.

- The pool is also available for birthday parties and other group events from noon to 4 p.m. Saturdays. The fee is \$45 per hour for the pool; \$25 per hour for the room.

Registration for spring swim lessons begins at 10 a.m. Saturday, March 23, at the Aquatics Center at Midlakes High School. Tentative dates are at 10 a.m. March 30, April 6, 13, 27 and May 4.
